HE IS RISEN.....OUR SAVIOR LIVES

What an honor and amazing privilege to be celebrating Easter with our church and community family. We are humbled and grateful for the privilege to be serving God in Warren, IN. After the last couple of years, this Easter seems different: more precious, more appreciated and more grateful. God has stirred something deep in our souls that need to be embraced and renewed. He is calling us for a changed heart through His resurrection power.

This Lenton season, through Word and song, we have been driven to the Cross. On the cross, Jesus was mostly silent. The excruciating pain He endured would have made it nearly impossible for Him to speak. Any utterance would have used the strength needed to pull himself up by His impaled hands and feet in order to take a breath. Therefore, the words Jesus spoke from the cross are significant.



His first words from the cross were a prayer. As the soldiers divided His clothes and cast lots, He cried out, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34). We see that even in the midst of injustice and humiliation, Jesus prayed for His persecutors. The Roman soldiers were doing what they had known and taught. Their allegiance was to the emperor, and they cared little about the Jewish scuffles of the day. However, we would later see that Jesus' prayer is answered, as the centurion overseeing the execution praised and confessed that Jesus was indeed a righteous man, the Son of God (Mark 15:39; Luke 23:47).

Jesus' second prayer, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matt. 27:46; Mark 15:34) is a recitation of Psalm 22. Many scholars believe this is an indication of the only time in Jesus' life when He was abandoned by the Father. Some scholars argue that this was the moment when the Son took upon Himself the sins of all humanity, and the Father turned from the presence of sin. Regardless of one's interpretation, Jesus' second prayer exemplifies the depth of His suffering on our behalf.

Jesus' final utterance from the cross is also His third prayer, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit" (Luke 23:46). Here, Jesus quotes Psalm 31:5 and announces to all His trust in His Heavenly Father to raise Him from the dead.

Laws and rules set standards of acceptable practice within communities, nations, and organizations. Laws set boundaries to try to create safe environments for all. But we all know that laws and rules have their limits. Laws are made by people in power. Laws can easily become forms of oppression, favoring some people while limiting and burdening others. What's more, laws do not make people good. Following a rule to avoid being punished does not make a person virtuous.

Romans 3:23 makes clear that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." But at the cross, Jesus took on himself the punishment for our sin. He paid the consequences of our lawlessness. And the power of the cross is not only in the payment of this debt but also in the freedom it offers. Jesus' death on the cross opens up for us the power to live full and holy lives, unburdened by the weight of guilt, shame, and human expectations. God is holy and good, and God created human beings as image bearers of his own goodness and holiness. The cross frees us to live as God intended—humbly, joyfully, and lovingly. Today, may the power of the cross release you into full living by God's goodness, mercy, and love.

In 1825 a typhoon came screaming across the South China Sea and literally smashed the city of Macao, where Portuguese settlers had once constructed a cathedral overlooking the harbor. When the force of the typhoon had subsided, not much was left of the cathedral. It was all gone except the front wall of the church which was left standing, and the bronze cross affixed to the crest of the facade. When the English governor of Hong Kong, Sir John Bowring, came to survey the damage, he was visibly impressed that only the cross remained standing. That evening as John Bowring sat in his room, he penned these words, "In the Cross of Christ I glory, towering o'er the wrecks of time. All the light of sacred story gathers round its head sublime." Centuries have come and gone since Roman soldiers forced Jesus Christ to bear His cross through the narrow streets of old Jerusalem, and when He fell under its load, forced another to bear it to Golgotha, a Hebrew word for "the place of the skull." Yet, the cross endures as a kind of symbol of Christianity, a strange symbol for a religion that now is embraced by more than I.5 billion people from every one of the 223 countries and territories on the face of the earth.

Parisians watched in heartache as 850-plus years of art, faith and culture blazed at Notre Dame Cathedral. The spire fell. The roofing was ravaged. But then, after officials announced that the cathedral would survive, signs of hope surfaced among the damage. The cathedral's golden altar cross was seen standing as officials surveyed the charred structure.

Good Friday celebrates the day our Lord died for our sins on the cross. I have often sat by the hour and tried to imagine the agony and suffering He went through because of our sins. At one point He said from the cross, "It is finished" (John 19:30). He meant that God had accepted His work on the cross as the penalty for our sins. Christ's death on our behalf is the reason God can forgive us and still be just. And His death teaches us the depth and breadth that there should be in our forgiveness of one another. While that holy Friday was tremendous, it was only a prelude to Sunday morning when He was raised from the dead. Godly women had come to see His tomb, but angels made the glorious announcement, "He has risen!" (Luke 24:6). His resurrection guaranteed that we, too, will be raised, if we are believers and obey His Word.

Easter is a season of great gladness for those who know Christ. But for those who are without "the light of the knowledge of God's glory" (2 Corinthians 4:6), there is nothing to rejoice over. Jesus left us with the great hope and certainty that He is going to return to bring a new Heaven and a new earth where, we are told, there will be no more sorrow, trouble, or death for those who have believed and followed Him. There will be trouble, sorrow, and suffering for those who have neglected or rejected Him. As Christians, our great task is to obey the command to tell the whole world about Christ crucified, buried, yet risen again. Our prayer for you during this season of the year, when we meditate on our Savior's great sacrifice for us on the cross, is that you will be filled with great peace and hope, because "He is risen!" That is the Good News.

Go, tell everyone He is Victorious!!!!



I am working on updating our church directory. Along with our printed directory I am working on starting up an online directory. This information would only be available to our church members who sign up. It is through Realm Connect which is what I am currently using in the office. The benefits of the online directory would be that you will have an app on your phones that would allow you to have access to everyone's addresses and phone numbers. You would also be able to update your information easily and add a photo. It will also be possible to message within groups of the church through the app instead of through email. You will be invited to join this directory by me through

email. It will ask you some questions and give instructions on how to load the app. In order for your information to be viewed by other members you need to allow permission to view by all members of the church. If you don't use email I will call you to ask if you would like to be included in the directory. So even if it's not something you will use, I can still add your information in so our member will easily have access to your address and phone number.









A proposal has been presented to the Administrative Board regarding creating a new room for the youth of our church. This would be for our 5th – 12th grades of youth. The proposal is to create their own space in the large basement room, right off the basement kitchen.

It would be set up with an audio/visual corner that will include couches, a TV for presentations and lessons. Another area would then be for set up with the ping pong table, pool table and the fooseball table that we already have. There would be an area then for snacks which would

include two high top tables, the popcorn machine and a hot dog machine which have been donated to the church. This would leave a different corner that could be left open for games.

The tables and chairs that are used for the fellowship hall, which currently are being stored in this area, would then be stored in the small room that was being used as the youth room. This room has become too small to use for youth nights. A larger area is needed.

This change/remodel would be an extensive project


which would include:


- Repairing the cracks in the floor
- Carpeting the floor with carpet tiles
- Removing all the wallpaper
- Painting the walls and stairway
- Replacing ceiling tiles and ceiling lights
- Replacing lights on the walls and stairway

In discussions with the board, the concern was presented about the "noodle making" project that has been done in the past. It would be rather difficult to make noodles with the carpeting and furniture in the room as tables are set up throughout the whole room for noodles to dry.

The board elected to take the concern to the congregation. The question is, will there be future noodle making on that large of a scale that the basement needs to be left as is?


